### **MODEL OF CARE**

Trauma-Informed Care is grounded in an understanding of and in response to the impact of trauma which emphasizes physical, psychological, and emotional safety for both providers and survivors to rebuild a sense of control and empowerment. **Safety** 

All program activities and settings are designed to promote the physical and emotional safety of our clients and staff.

**Collaboration** 

We include our clients' input in planning and evaluating our service. We respect our clients' life experiences and history, and operate from a model of doing "with" rather than "to" or "for" our clients.

**Trustworthiness** 

We build trust with those we serve by making the tasks in our service delivery clear, by ensuring consistency in practice, and maintaining appropriate boundaries in our programs.

Choice Empowerment

We design our services to ensure that our clients' experiences of choice and control are maximized. We recognize and emphasize our client's strengths and skills by focusing on skill development and enhancement. We convey optimism about the capacity of our client to reach their goals.

# PRESIDENT and CEO



Dear Friends,

The past year has been a year of remarkable achievement and pivotal significance for The Children's Shelter.

For several years, The Children's Shelter had been researching the effects of abuse and neglect and identifying key models of intervention that would help children heal from their traumatic experiences. In our exploration, we found that children exposed to high levels of stress and traumas are more likely to be at risk for depression, substance abuse, and many other health related issues. Moreover, normal life stages like high school graduation, employment and developing healthy relationships with others were also negatively impacted. Recognizing that we serve nearly 5,000 vulnerable children and parents each year, many of which experienced traumatic episodes in their life; we were determined to offer services that help them heal from their trauma and reduce the likelihood of them becoming a negative statistic.

For that reason, The Children's Shelter underwent a two year process that transformed the agency to a trauma-informed and trauma specific organization. We were officially certified in July of 2015. Our certification, administered and monitored by Community Connections Inc. based out of Washington, DC, declared The Children's Shelter not only understood the adverse effects of trauma (trauma-informed) but that our services and interactions with our children and parents promoted safety, trustworthiness, collaboration, empowerment and choice (trauma specific). We are proud to be certified in trauma specific care and to be among the first in our area to achieve that distinction.

To further combat the effects of trauma, in October of 2015, we opened the Harvey E. Najim Hope Center, a mental health facility serving children and families impacted by abuse and neglect. The first of its kind in South Texas, the Hope Center offers trauma specific treatment by licensed therapists and social workers specifically trained in trauma models with proven results. In addition, our program integrates the clinical model with the child's home environment to ensure a holistic approach to care. In the first eight months of service, we surpassed our goal of 200 children served—illustrating the great need in our community.

Because the need is still great, our work is not over; The Children's Shelter will continue to provide services that are both impactful and transformational to the children and families we serve. My greatest thanks go out to our supporters and partners who have made it possible. If you have not yet joined our efforts, please consider joining us as we continue to fight against child abuse and neglect in our community.

### **DID YOU KNOW?**

The Children's Shelter President/CEO, Annette Rodriguez provided invited testimony during the 84th Interim Legislative Session at the Texas Senate Commission on Health & Human Services on April 20, 2016. Annette spoke to the agency's Model of Care and spoke on the High Acuity Charge: Study the increase in higher acuity children with trauma and mental illness in the state foster care system, and recommend ways to ensure children have timely access to appropriate treatment and placement options.

### 343 children ages 0-16 in the EMERGENCY SHELTER

The Children's Shelter Zachary Cottage is a trauma-informed care environment that can accommodate up to 66 children who are newborn up to 16 years of age. Children in our care come from hard places and face emotional challenges due to chronic trauma of prolonged abuse, neglect, and/or abandonment. When children are placed at the emergency shelter, they receive medical, dental, and psychological assessments to understand their individual situations. During their stay, children experience normal activities such as school and recreational time, as well as specialized activities, case management, and other activities to meet their needs. Children placed at the emergency shelter stay as little as 72-hours and up to 90 days.

58% of children served are four years old and younger

98% of children served maintained or showed improvement in developmental milestones at discharge

45% of children are discharged to a foster home

95% of children served expressed satisfaction with services provided

Leo, who was nonverbal when he first came in, hid behind a caretaker shaking and sobbing when approached by another adult. After several days of consistent connections, verbal praise, and genuine care, he began to verbalize his needs, smiles came through, and a few "high fives" were shared with staff. Now after a few months in our care, he eagerly waits for those big high fives and is a "chatter box!" It's an amazing transformation, and amazing healing!!!!

#### 63 children ages 5-12 in the

#### RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT CENTER

The Residential Treatment Center (RTC) is home to up to 36 children, ages 5 to 12 years, who have suffered complex trauma from repeated forms of abuse or neglect over the majority of their young lives. Children who have suffered severe emotional trauma often find it difficult to heal and thrive in a traditional family-based setting. Through therapeutic programs and individualized attention, the RTC is a positive and trauma-informed environment designed specifically to help our children succeed. Through structured program goals, children learn to manage behaviors and eventually find their forever family through foster care or adoption.

### 248 children ages 3-18 and 110 families served through the Harvey E. Najim Hope Center

The Harvey E. Najim Hope Center is an outpatient mental health clinic providing a continuum of trauma-informed care for children in Bexar County who are suffering traumatic and emotional disorders as a result of prolonged abuse, neglect or abandonment. The Hope Center offers accessible, specialized programs by licensed counselors, psychiatrists, and social workers in a loving, safe environment. The Harvey E. Najim Hope Center opened in October 2015, and is the first of its kind in South Texas.

#### 186 children ages 0-18 and 86 active Foster Families served through **FOSTER CARE / PERMANENCY**

Foster homes provide care for children birth through 18 years old who have faced acute or chronic trauma associated with abuse, neglect, and/or abandonment. Foster care ranges from overnight to several years, with the average stay being 18 months. Foster parents may elect to adopt children when their biological parent's rights have been terminated.

When asked what the best part about adoption is, a 10-year-old (who is with his forever family) recently said, "because I'm home."

### 287 mothers and 242 children in NURSE-FAMILY PARTNERSHIP®

The Nurse-Family Partnership® is dedicated to helping first time, low-income mothers become successful parents by providing home visits by baccalaureate registered nurses. One of 22 in Texas, the program model is rooted in over thirty years of evaluation and is proven to improve prenatal and maternal health, child development, reduce child maltreatment, and increase self-sufficiency.

#### 29 fathers and 928 children in COMPADRE Y COMPADRE®

Compadre Y Compadre<sup>®</sup> is a 15-week mentoring program that provides men in a fatherhood role the opportunity to learn valuable, life-changing skills as father, provider, teacher, and hero. While most participants are referred to the program from Child Protective Services or the court system, some participate voluntarily seeking the chance to become a stronger and more nurturing parent.

Highly trained and qualified Parent Educators work with families to facilitate evidence based parent education curricula to help identify strengths, develop goals, and build self-sufficiency.



The Children's Shelter is extremely grateful to the many committed, caring, and compassionate volunteers who work directly with our children in care at the Emergency Shelter, Residential Treatment Center, Foster Care, and Family Strengthening programs. Community involvement is immeasurable because of the direct impact on the children being cared for. Our volunteers make an impact in the community and in the lives of young children who need it most.

This past fiscal year, we were gifted with 13,793 hours by dedicated volunteers. As an agency, we take the value of our volunteers very seriously. In fact, if we were to assign a financial value to the services they bring, it would equate to approximately \$119,782 for individual volunteers and \$202,972 for our groups! That's an average of \$677 that each and every individual volunteer brings when they volunteer with us, and \$1,381 on average for each group!

Now, that's just the part we can measure. What we can't measure are all the smiles on children's faces when someone

cares enough to serve as their mentor. We can't measure the love that is felt when a baby who needs a healing touch is held by a caring adult. We can't measure the joy of the laughter that comes from children playing with volunteer groups on the playground, or enjoying a special activity. There is just not a way to measure all the personal connection that is happening each and everyday because of our volunteers.




